Chapter 1 Pray for Israel and the Jewish People



Introduction

One of the most meaningful and accessible ways Christians can stand with Israel and the Jewish people is through prayer. Throughout Scripture, prayer is presented as a powerful means by which believers participate in God's purposes on earth. While Christians may differ on various theological perspectives regarding Israel, there is broad agreement that praying for peace, protection, justice, and reconciliation reflects the heart of God.

Above all, may Your purposes be fulfilled, Your name be honored, and Your peace prevail throughout the land.

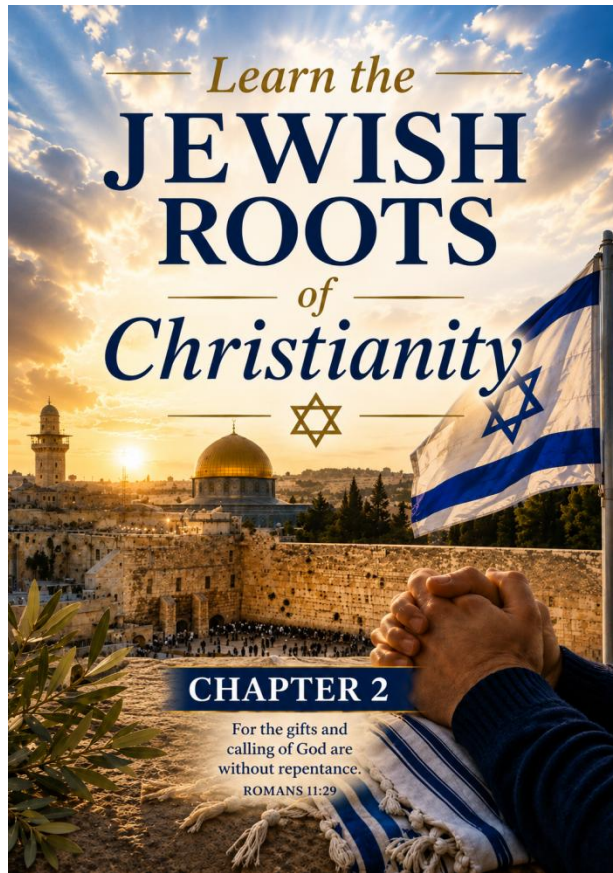

Chapter 2. Learn the Jewish Roots of Christianity



Understanding the Faith of Jesus and the Apostles

One of the most meaningful ways Christians can stand with Israel and the Jewish people is by developing a deeper understanding of the Jewish roots of their faith. Christianity did not emerge in a cultural or historical vacuum. Jesus was Jewish. His disciples were Jewish. The apostles were Jewish. The early church was overwhelmingly Jewish during its earliest years. The Scriptures that Jesus read, taught from, and quoted were the Hebrew Scriptures—the books Christians now call the Old Testament.

For many Christians, discovering the Jewish context of the Bible is like uncovering a missing piece of a puzzle. Familiar passages take on new meaning, biblical symbols become clearer, and God's redemptive plan appears with greater depth and continuity.

helps believers appreciate not only the origins of their faith but also God's enduring relationship with the Jewish people.

Christianity Was Born Within Judaism

Jesus was born into a Jewish family, circumcised according to Jewish law, worshiped in the synagogue, celebrated the biblical feasts, and taught from the Hebrew Scriptures. His ministry took place almost entirely within the Jewish world of first-century Judea and Galilee.

The New Testament begins not with a new religion but with the fulfillment of promises made to Israel centuries earlier. Matthew's Gospel opens by tracing Jesus' genealogy back to Abraham and King David, emphasizing His place within Israel's history and covenant story.

The apostles viewed themselves as faithful Jews who had found their Messiah. They continued to worship in the Temple, observe Jewish customs, and proclaim that Jesus was the fulfillment of the promises given to the patriarchs and prophets.

Recognizing these realities helps Christians understand that their faith is deeply connected to the history, Scriptures, and spiritual heritage of the Jewish people.

Study the Old Testament and the Tanakh

Many Christians spend most of their time reading the New Testament, yet the New Testament itself is built upon the foundation of the Hebrew Scriptures. The Old Testament contains the covenants, prophecies, laws, wisdom literature, and historical narratives that shaped the worldview of Jesus and the apostles.

The Jewish Bible, known as the Tanakh, contains the same books found in the Protestant Old Testament, although they are arranged differently. The word "Tanakh" is an acronym derived from three sections:

- **Torah** (The Law)
- **Nevi'im** (The Prophets)
- **Ketuvim** (The Writings)

When Christians study the Tanakh, they gain insight into:

- God's covenant with Abraham
- The Exodus from Egypt
- The giving of the Torah at Sinai
- The establishment of the Davidic Kingdom
- The ministries of the prophets
- The promises concerning redemption and restoration

Understanding these foundational themes provides a richer context for understanding the New Testament.

Learn Jewish History

Feast of Tabernacles (Sukkot)

Celebrating God's provision during Israel's wilderness journey and looking forward to God's presence among His people.

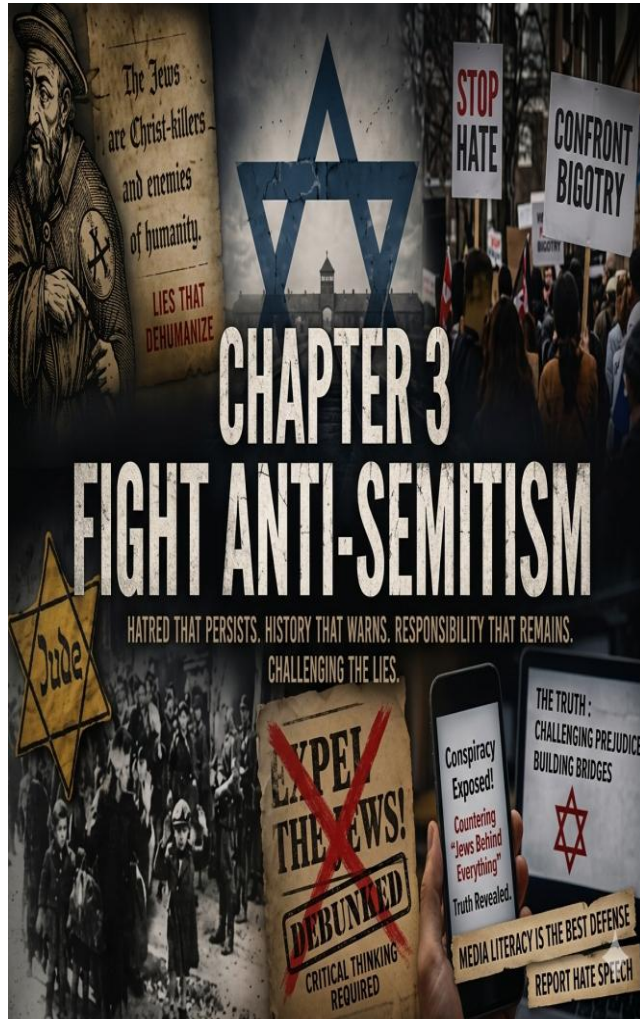

Confronting One of History's Oldest Hatreds

Throughout history, few groups have endured such persistent and widespread hatred as the Jewish people. Across centuries and continents, Jews have faced discrimination, exclusion, persecution, forced conversions, expulsions, pogroms, and genocide. Although the forms of anti-Semitism have changed over time, the underlying prejudice remains a troubling reality in many parts of the world.

For Christians, opposing anti-Semitism is not merely a social or political issue; it is a moral and biblical responsibility. The Jewish people are the recipients of God's covenant promises, the custodians of the Hebrew Scriptures, and the people through whom the Messiah came into the world. Any hatred directed toward Jews contradicts the biblical command to love one's neighbor and honor the dignity of every person created in the image of God.

Unfortunately, history also records occasions when individuals and institutions identifying as Christian contributed to antisemitic attitudes and actions. While many Christians courageously defended Jewish communities, others remained silent or participated in prejudice. Recognizing this history should motivate believers today to ensure that anti-Semitism finds no place within the Church.

What Is Anti-Semitism?

Anti-Semitism is hostility, prejudice, discrimination, or hatred directed toward Jewish people because they are Jewish. It can appear in obvious forms, such as vandalism, threats, violence, or discriminatory policies. It can also emerge in more subtle ways through stereotypes, conspiracy theories, exclusion, or derogatory comments.

Anti-Semitism often adapts to the culture and era in which it appears. In one generation it may take religious forms, in another racial forms, and in another political forms. Yet despite changing expressions, its core remains the same: hostility toward Jews as a people.

Understanding the Long History of Anti-Semitism

The history of anti-Semitism stretches back thousands of years. The Jewish people have repeatedly found themselves targeted because of their distinct identity, beliefs, and traditions.

In the ancient world, Jews were often viewed with suspicion because they worshiped one God while surrounding cultures embraced many gods. Their refusal to assimilate completely into surrounding societies sometimes led to hostility and misunderstanding.

Many hoped that the lessons of the Holocaust would permanently end anti-Semitism. Yet antisemitic incidents continue to occur around the world, demonstrating that prejudice remains a persistent challenge.

Recognizing Modern Anti-Semitism

Modern anti-Semitism may not always appear in the forms associated with earlier centuries. Today it often manifests through conspiracy theories, online harassment, hate crimes, vandalism of synagogues and cemeteries, and the spread of false information.

Common warning signs include:

- Claims that Jews secretly control governments, media, or financial institutions.
- Holding all Jews collectively responsible for the actions of individual Jews.
- Denying or minimizing the Holocaust.
- Demonizing Jewish people as inherently evil or disloyal.
- Applying standards to Jews that are not applied to other groups.
- Using offensive stereotypes or caricatures.

Christians should exercise discernment and carefully evaluate information before accepting or sharing it. Many antisemitic claims are rooted in myths and falsehoods that have circulated for generations.

Challenge Anti-Semitic Stereotypes

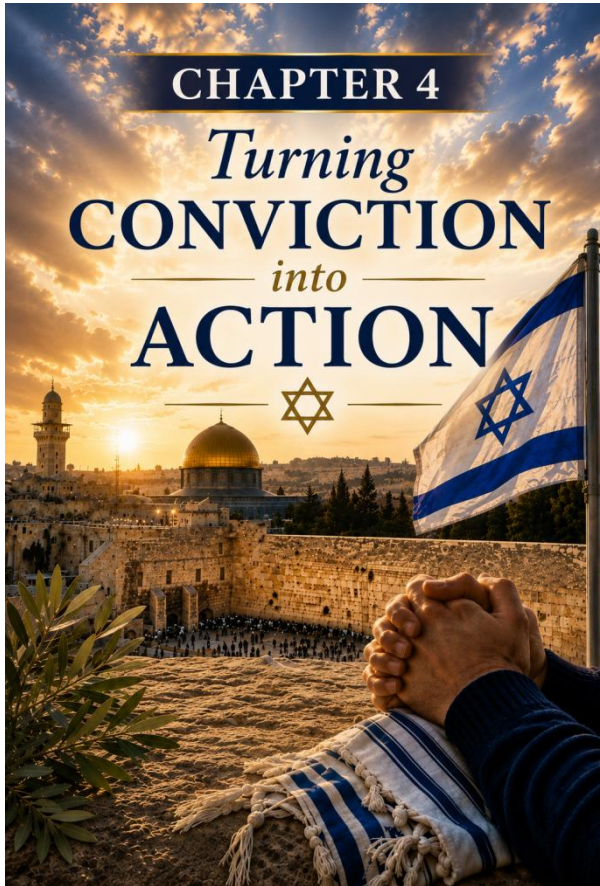

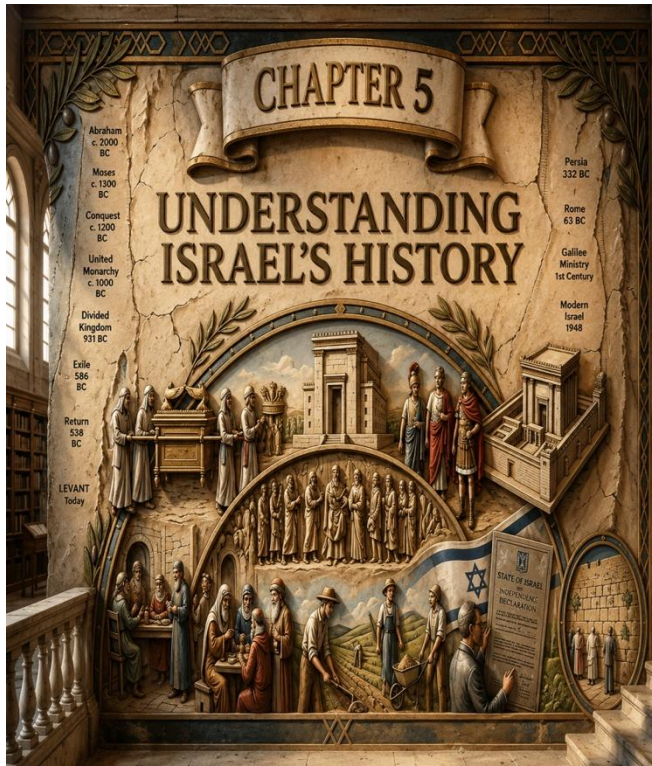

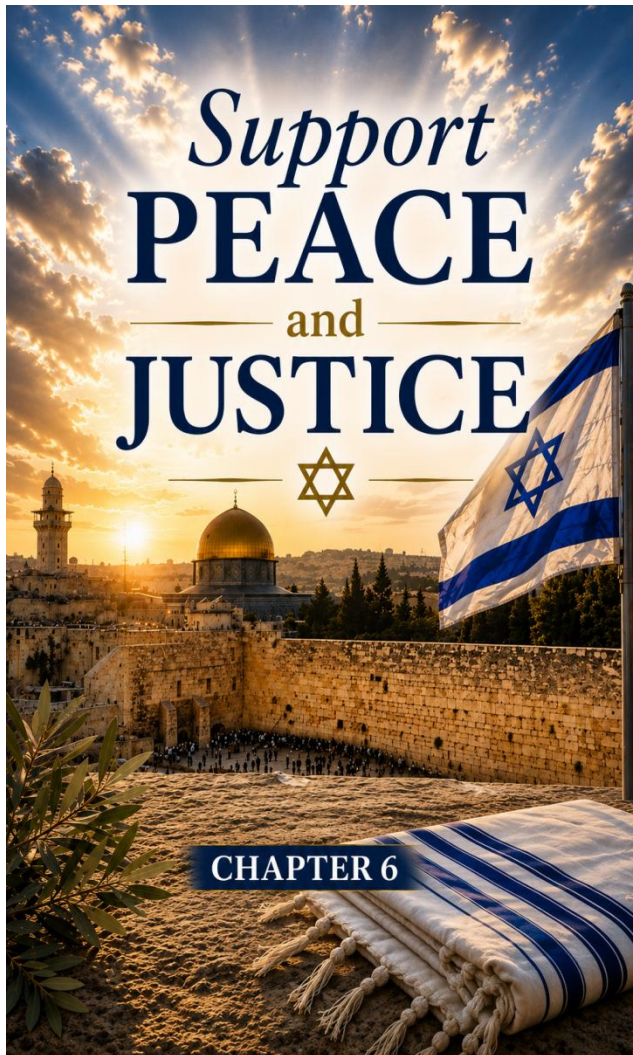

Christians seeking to stand with Israel should follow this example.

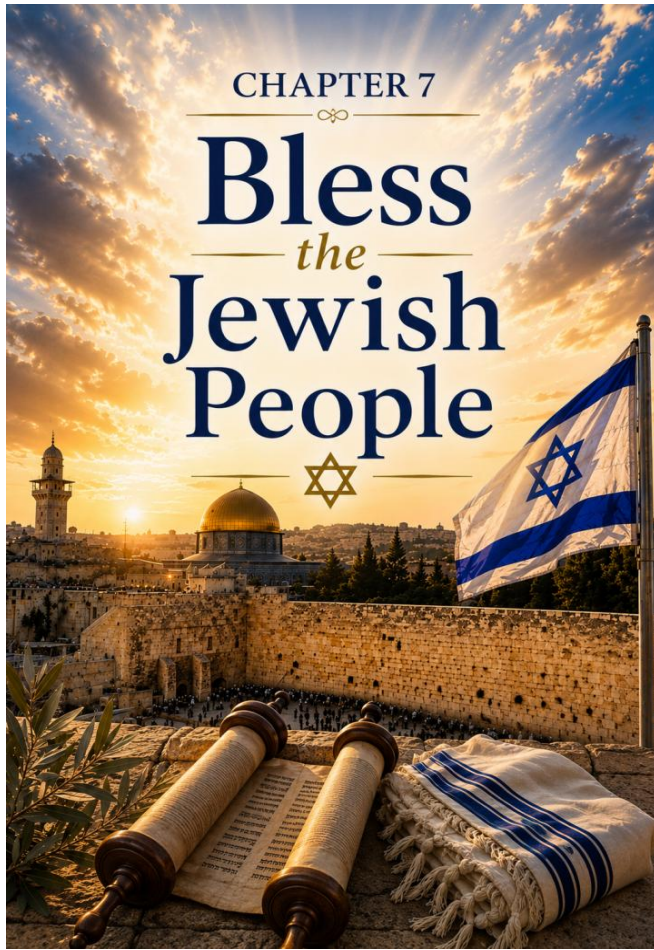

God is a God of truth. Scripture consistently emphasizes honesty, integrity, and the rejection of falsehood.

In a world saturated with misinformation, half-truths, propaganda, and conspiracy theories, Christians have a responsibility to pursue truth diligently.

This responsibility is especially important when discussing Israel and the Jewish people.

Believers should:

- Verify information before sharing it.
- Avoid repeating rumors or stereotypes.
- Seek credible sources.
- Study history carefully.
- Be willing to correct misunderstandings.

Truth is not advanced through exaggeration or distortion. Even when defending a worthy cause, Christians must remain committed to honesty.

A reputation for truthfulness strengthens Christian witness and reflects the character of the God who is described in Scripture as the source of all truth.

Prayer Rather Than Indifference

Prayer is one of the most powerful ways Christians express concern for others.

Throughout Scripture, God's people are called to intercede on behalf of nations, leaders, communities, and individuals. Prayer acknowledges both God's sovereignty and humanity's dependence upon Him.

When believers pray for Israel, they demonstrate that they care about the welfare of the Jewish people and the future of the region.

Prayer reflects compassion rather than indifference.

It moves discussions beyond political debates and places them within the context of God's purposes and His desire for peace, justice, and reconciliation.

The Apostle Paul specifically warned Gentile believers against arrogance regarding Israel. In Romans 11, he reminded them that they had been graciously included in God's redemptive plan and should therefore respond with humility rather than boastfulness.

Humility recognizes that:

- No individual possesses complete knowledge.
- Complex issues require careful consideration.
- Others may have experiences different from our own.
- God's purposes are often greater than human understanding.

Humility also enables meaningful dialogue. People are more likely to listen when they sense respect and sincerity rather than arrogance and self-righteousness.

Standing with Israel should never produce pride or superiority. Instead, it should cultivate gratitude for God's faithfulness and humility before His sovereign purposes.

Becoming a Reflection of God's Faithfulness

The survival of the Jewish people throughout history has often been viewed as a remarkable testimony to God's faithfulness.

Empires have risen and fallen. Nations have appeared and disappeared. Yet the Jewish people have maintained their identity through centuries of exile, persecution, and dispersion.

For many Christians, this reality serves as a reminder that God keeps His promises.

When believers stand with Israel, they are not merely expressing support for a nation or an ethnic group. They are affirming their confidence in a God who remains faithful across generations.

This confidence should inspire Christians to become people who themselves reflect faithfulness, integrity, compassion, and love.

Looking Toward God's Future

The Bible ultimately points toward a future in which God's purposes are fully realized. The prophets envisioned a day when peace, justice, and righteousness would prevail. The New Testament speaks of God's plan to bring redemption and reconciliation to the world.

Christians may differ on the details of prophecy and eschatology, but they share a common hope in God's ultimate triumph over evil and His establishment of lasting peace.

Until that day comes, believers are called to live as ambassadors of God's kingdom.

And it means extending friendship, compassion, and support to the Jewish people as an expression of God's enduring faithfulness.
